Client feedback

A range of project outcomes were achieved for clients

Clients shared what they saw as the main outcome of their CSI supported project via our survey. The main outcomes were:

CSI is helping clients to progress their organisations

There is broad agreement from clients via our feedback survey that CSI is helping to progress their organisations, with 86% of respondents reporting CSI contributing to good or excellent progress.







Close to 9 out of 10 survey respondents reported being very satisfied with CSI's work with their organisation. A further 9% reported being slightly satisfied, and 3% were slightly dissatisfied.

Te Pūaha o te Ako's open source support is Foundation North's koha to the community sector

Te Pūaha is a flexible resource base that responds to the diverse and changing needs of the Aotearoa community sector.

Over the course of the year Te Pūaha responded to the impact of extreme weather with flood relief funding resources and supported the community sectors' interest in supporting wellbeing and embedding evaluation through insights pieces and talks.
