- Recognises Māori as tāngata whenua – the first peoples
- Supports stronger outcomes for all communities
- Strengthens trust and partnership
- Honours Te Tiriti as Aotearoa's founding document
- Ensures our people, environment, and future generations thrive

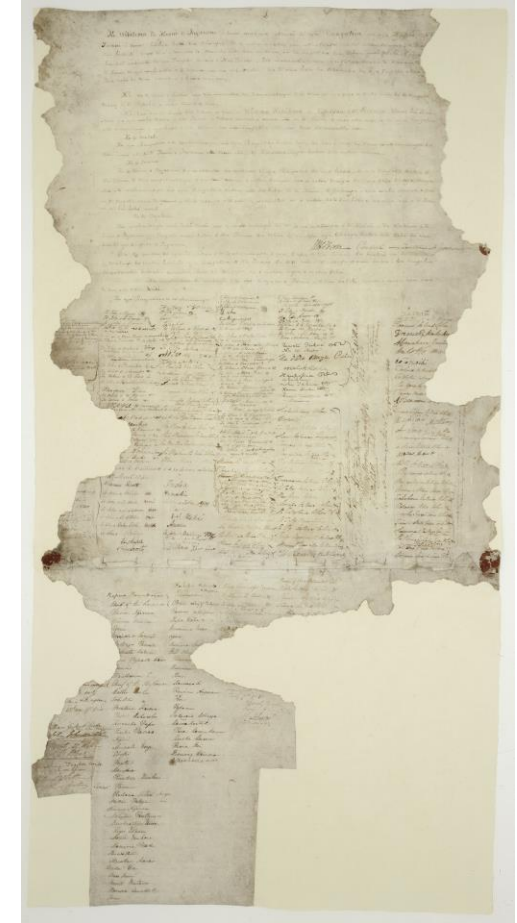

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# Practical tips – working in partnership with Māori

- Begin with relationships – whakawhanaungatanga
- Listen first – mātauranga Māori matters
- Co-design, don't just consult
- Respect tikanga and reo Māori
- Share power and resources fairly

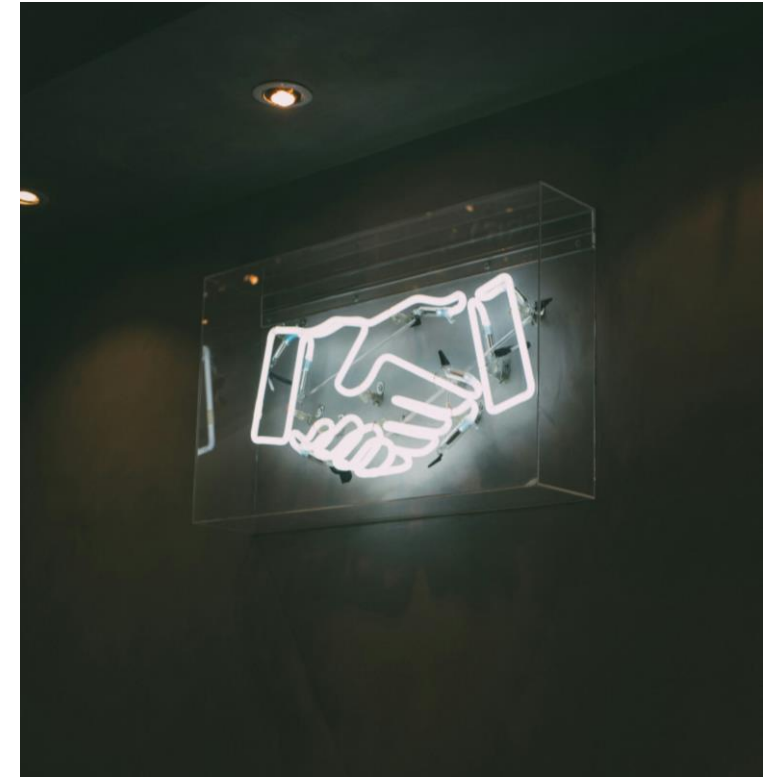

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# Partnerships between Māori/Tāngata Whenua and Tāngata Tiriti

- Acknowledge, partnership is a journey!
- Understand the unique role of tāngata whenua
- Create space for Māori leadership and voice
- Recognise and value of all cultures (tāngata Tiriti)
- Build inclusive practices for all communities
- Everyone has a role in honouring Te Tiriti
