COVID-19 Leave Support Scheme	If you need to self-isolate and you cannot work from home, your employer (or you, if you are self-employed) can apply for the COVID-19 Leave Support Scheme. The COVID-19 Leave Support is paid as a lump sum, calculated to cover 2 weeks. COVID-19 Resurgence Support Payment	The Resurgence Support Payment (RSP) is a payment to help support viable and ongoing businesses or organisations due to a COVID-19 alert level increase to level 2 or higher. COVID-19 Short-term Absence Payment	<p>If you're staying at home because you're waiting on a COVID-19 test result and you cannot work from home, your employer could apply for the COVID-19 Short-term Absence Payment. This payment is also available to self-employed people.</p> <p>A one-off payment of \$350 is available for each employee. Your employer can apply for it once for you in any 30-day period. Redundancy Support	As the impact of COVID-19 increases, experiencing job loss could be a reality for many. If you've lost your job or you run a business and are faced with laying off your employees, there may be support options available to you. Wage Subsidy Schemes	<p>Wage subsidies will be available to support workers who are financially impacted by COVID-19.
